THE SEARCH

The Michigan State University College of Nursing invites applications for the position of Associate/Full Professor in the Tenure System Faculty Appointment System. Michigan State University actively promotes a dynamic research and learning environment in which qualified individuals of differing perspectives, and cultural backgrounds pursue academic goals and shared inquiry. Academic and research ethics are assumed of all faculty in the College of Nursing. Desired area of inquiry will match the college research concentrations in illness prevention, health promotion and support through self-care with chronic conditions.

The appointment of academic rank and salary are dependent on evidence of research, teaching and scholarship achievements. This is a 9-month, academic year faculty position.

RESPONSIBILITIES

Position responsibilities include:

- Maintain an established program of funded extramural and interdisciplinary research, including incorporation of all ethical and professional standards.
- Build upon current record of published nursing scholarship in area(s) that enhance and/or compliment current College concentrations.
- Teaching across undergraduate and graduate nursing education in area(s) of expertise.
- Significant experience with community outreach and national service.
- Ongoing involvement with college and university committees.
- Demonstrated commitment to student mentorship across undergraduate and graduate nursing education.

QUALIFICATIONS

The ideal candidate will possess the following qualifications and professional experience:

- Graduate degree in Nursing with PhD in Nursing or related field.
- Have or eligible for an unrestricted RN license without probationary status.
- Record of success in acquiring and sustaining national extramural funding.
- National recognition in research area.
- Demonstrated ability to establish a strong interdisciplinary research team.
- Record of peer-reviewed publications and presentations
- Teaching experience at the undergraduate and/or graduate level in nursing or related field.
- Experience in collaborative and team relationships in teaching.
- Demonstrated record of advising and mentoring students.
- Commitment to scholarly work to enhance practice, policy and education.
- Demonstrated record of service at state and/or national level.
- Meet criteria for appointment as an Associate or Full Professor in the tenure track at Michigan State University College of Nursing.

About the College of Nursing

The College of Nursing at Michigan State University is a growing community of scholars, teachers and practitioners with a full array of academic programs at the undergraduate and graduate levels. The College has excellent academic and student support operations and an outstanding Center for Nursing Research, Scholarship & Innovation that provides support in all aspects of research and scholarly roles. The College of Nursing is committed to the land grant philosophy and its relationship with the community.

The College of Nursing embraces the concept of access to education and has developed several pathways for individuals to enter and progress through its educational programs. The College has invested in distance education and virtual technology that enhances learning and student/faculty interaction. The College is committed to the generation of knowledge through research and the education of future clinical nurse researchers. The faculty competes favorably for national funding to support research programs and they are engaged in translating their findings into clinical practice.

The College opened the [BOTT Building for Nursing Education and Research in October of 2012](#). Through a gift of \$7 million from The Timothy and Bernadette Marquez Foundation, a \$7.5 million research infrastructure grant from the National Institutes of Health (NIH), and broad based donor support from friends and alumni, the building project has become a reality. The NIH research infrastructure funds were dedicated to the construction of two floors of research space, including space for the Center for Nursing Research, Scholarship & Innovation. The Building creates a highly visible presence for nursing in the University's health science campus. It supports the College's growth as a national research leader.

The BOTT Building is connected by a bridge to the College of Nursing building in the Life Science complex. The first floor houses classrooms, the student commons and lounge, Office of Student

Affairs, Office of Development and Alumni Relations, conference rooms, an atrium and reception lounge. The second and third floors provide space for PhD students and College of Nursing researchers. The space also includes the Center for Nursing Research, Scholarship & Innovation, seminar rooms, meeting space, a PhD student collaboratory, a research collaboratory, interview rooms and 60 modular pods that serve as workstations.

The Center for Nursing Research, Scholarship & Innovation provides pre-award, post-award, and professional development support to faculty and PhD students. Staff support includes a grant administrator, a research secretary, statistical support and writing/editing support. The Center for Nursing Research, Scholarship & Innovation and the College of Nursing Research Committee sponsor a visiting scholars program, faculty development seminars, a writing group and mentoring for junior faculty. An external research mentor program is also available to faculty. The Center for Nursing Research, Scholarship & Innovation faculty and staff also coordinate the College's Undergraduate Student Research Program. The Center for Nursing Research, Scholarship & Innovation support the College's research concentrations of illness prevention, health promotion and support through self-care with chronic conditions.

Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) Programs

- Accelerated Second Degree BSN Program: For students already holding a bachelor's degree or higher in another field
- RN-BSN Program: For registered nurses holding an associate degree or diploma in nursing and currently hold an unrestricted RN license

Other Baccalaureate Level Programs

- **ACCESS Program**
- The ACCESS program provides financial and educational support to motivated high school students who are admitted to MSU as a pre-nursing student.
- **Nurse Scholars Program**
- The Nurse Scholars Program gives high-achieving high school students the opportunity to earn conditional admission into the College straight out of high school.
- **RN to BSN Community College Partnership Program** - Associate Degree in Nursing

students who have enrolled in clinical nursing courses in the nursing major are eligible to apply for transfer admission to Michigan State University into the RN to BSN program. Community College Partners include:

 - Study Abroad provides students a chance to grow professionally while learning about other people, places and cultures, and broadens their education and perspective on the world.

Doctorate of Nursing Practice (DNP) Program

The MSU College of Nursing Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) curriculum prepares Advanced Practice Registered Nurses to provide clinical, organizational and systems' leadership at the highest level. The program develops practitioners who design, implement and evaluate high quality and cost-effective healthcare services for diverse populations including the disadvantaged and underserved. Graduates are prepared to champion healthcare policy and operational changes using evidence-based data and technology that will enhance and guides nursing practice. DNP prepared nurses actively collaborates across disciplines and organizations with providers and client groups to achieve sustainable healthcare outcomes.

MSU offers seamless pathways to the DNP²:

- BSN to DNP*
- Post-graduate DNP

The DNP currently consists of three concentrations:

- Family Nurse Practitioner
- Adult Gerontology Primary Care Nurse Practitioner
- Adult-Gerontology Clinical Nurse Specialist

Two new concentrations are currently under development with anticipated enrollment commencing fall 2019:

- Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner
- Pediatric Nurse Practitioner – Primary Care

² The new DNP program offers students the master's degree completion option on their way to completing the DNP. This allows students to sit for national board certification before completing the doctorate.

The Council on Accreditation of Nurse Anesthesia Education Programs (COA) requires that all students matriculating into a nurse anesthesia educational program on January 1, 2022 or thereafter be enrolled in a program approved by the COA to award a practice doctoral degree. The program plans to submit its application to the COA for approval to award the Doctorate of Nurse Practice degree in May 2018. Pending approval by the COA, the program plans to enroll its first doctoral cohort of students in May 2019. PhD Program

The College of Nursing prepares PhD scholars who are ready to assume leadership roles in academia and research. Students with a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree or higher are eligible to apply for the PhD in Nursing. We seek to prepare students to become independent researchers studying clinical phenomena.

Research is an integral part of the College's mission. PhD students have the opportunity to work with expert faculty in the areas of chronic conditions and healthy families and populations while building the skills necessary to pursue a life of scholarly inquiry.

College of Nursing researchers transfer findings into practice to improve patient care and the quality of patient and family outcomes. Faculty seek external funding from sources including National Institutes of Health, USDA, and National Science Foundation to support their program of research.

The College's PhD program offers students the opportunity to move in scholarly directions and provides opportunities for interdisciplinary study. The College's areas of excellence in scientific and interdisciplinary research include:

- Cancer
- Cardiovascular Disease
- Nutrition
- Chronic Illness Management (symptom management and self-care)
- Obesity and Associated Conditions (children)
- Physical Activity
- End of Life

As of Fall 2017, the College had 87 faculty members and 20 staff members.

Accreditation

The Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) has fully accredited the BSN, MSN, and DNP programs offered by the College of Nursing. The next scheduled accreditation visit is in 2022.

The Nurse Anesthesia concentration has received accreditation through the Council on Accreditation of Nurse Anesthesia Education programs (COA), a specialized accrediting body recognized by the Council for Higher Education Accreditation and the United States Department of Education Accredited Nurse Anesthesia Programs.

MSU plans to enroll its first doctoral cohort of Nurse Anesthesia students pending approval from the Council on Accreditation of Nurse Anesthesia Education Programs. The next scheduled accreditation visit is in 2023.

In addition, the Bachelor of Science in Nursing programs have been approved by the Michigan Board of Nursing; upon completion of the traditional and accelerated option BSN programs, graduates are eligible to take the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN).

EAST LANSING

The University is situated in a 5,200-acre park-like setting along the banks of the Red Cedar River in East Lansing, Michigan. The campus is unique, not only in its remarkable size, but also in terms of its beauty. The campus has 532 buildings, including 103 academic buildings, and it continues to expand. MSU's immediate neighbor is the city of East Lansing with a population of 48,000, many of whose residents are affiliated with the university.
